

INVASIVE SPECIES:
EARLY DETECTION/RATIONAL RESPONSE

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Early Detection Species Discussed:

Easy Eight:

1. Oriental Bittersweet
2. Barberry (both Japanese and European)
3. Winged Euonymus (a.k.a. Burning Bush)
4. Autumn Olive (and the similar Russian Olive)
5. English Ivy and Climbing Euonymus
6. Privet (any of the many varieties)
7. Garlic Mustard
8. Multiflora Rose

Secondary Six:

1. Swallow-wort (Black and Pale)
2. Common Reed (a.k.a. Phragmites australis or "Phrag")
3. Japanese Honeysuckle
4. Purple Loosetrife (effective biocontrol may be reducing its importance)
5. Knotweed (a.k.a. American Bamboo)
6. Yellow Iris

Special Cases:

1. tree seedlings (Norway maple)
2. aquatic plants (Parrotfeather)
3. Emerald Ash Borer beetle
4. Mile-a-Minute Vine
5. Golden Bamboo (*Phyllostachys aurea*)
6. Ailanthus (Tree of Heaven)
7. Eulalia, Chinese Silvergrass, or *Miscanthus sinensis*
8. Buckthorn (Glossy and Common)

Important Invaders NOT Part of this Program:

- most aquatic plants (frogbit, yellow floating-heart, etc.) (see H. Leeson's program)
- taxonomically challenging ones (Japanese stilt grass, *Aralia* sp.)
- debatable invasive status (black locust)

- F. How rough is your project site? (note: this one works backwards, with easiest at the bottom)
 1. heavy brush, wet and/or rocky ledge, etc.
 2. woods, thorns, ticks
 3. lawn, garden, field
